## **Garden Gossip**

"Municipal Rose Garden goes in Rehab"

Years of neglect, weeds growing wild, lack of attention cause San Jose Municipal Rose Garden to be put on probation. All-America-Rose-Selection says "clean up your act" or they are pulling the plug on accreditation as a AARS Display Garden.

Tongues were wagging this spring when Councilmember Oliverio proposed public-private bidding and partnerships. Concerned citizens sprung into action and the City pledged to do something about the Rose Garden's plight. It was time for an "intervention". Local Rosarians formed "Friends of the San Jose Rose Garden" and adopted the park, organizing volunteer efforts while encouraging the City to do their part. The garden is now in "Rehab".

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#### "FREE THE ROSES" RECAP

They came early, and stayed late. They came from around the corner and as far away as Morgan Hill. The young, seniors, and everyone in between showed up in force to "Free the Roses". Snip, Snip, Snip echoed through the garden the morning of September 15<sup>th</sup> as over volunteers from around the




Silicon Valley descended on the Historic San Jose Municipal Rose Garden to "dead head" the roses and weed the beds. "I didn't expect to see such a huge crowd" said Mike Azevedo, the new groundsworker, who worked tirelessly emptying garbage cans full of dead blooms. "This garden will look great in October with the new blooms"

The event even brought out San Jose Councilmember Pierluigi Oliverio who was instrumental in bringing the spotlight back on the Historic Rose Garden. He spent a couple of hours "pulling his weight in weeds."

Some interesting statistics from the volunteer day - of the 150 that signed in, 54 came from the 95126 zip code (within 2 miles from the

park), 100 came from San Jose, with the 50 or so from outside of San Jose. This truly shows there is a regional appeal to this park. A yahoo "mash up" below shows the extent of the volunteer support from the region.



As everyone knows, the Garden is currently on "probation" by the All-American Rose Selections' Public Gardens Committee due to poor conditions caused by budget cuts from the City. It was this fact that brought out many of the volunteers.

This effort has caught the attention of the All-American Rose Selections' Public Gardens Committee, which placed the garden on probation who wrote in their most recent letter to the City of San Jose: "We were quite pleased with the recent story in the San Jose Mercury News which detailed the community's efforts to improve the Garden. The effort is fantastic and we will be sure to share the story with the members of the All-American Rose Selections' Public Garden Committee and other AARS members. It is a truly inspirational effort on the Community's part and once again...Great job!" Looks like your Volunteer efforts are already paying off!

### **Volunteer Opportunities**

#### **Massive Volunteer Day**

Organized Weekend Group Events

These large events are advertised through the volunteer database and through the local media. 4 days a year are scheduled and 150+ plus volunteers descend on the garden for this huge event. They are staff them with experienced volunteer rosarians, and city staff to assist and train volunteers who may need some extra help. Dates Scheduled for 2007:

- January 12, 9 a.m. 1 p.m. Pruning Day and Demonstration. As you know, due to staffing levels, the city only pruned 20% of the roses last year. This contributed to the overall poor conditions reflected in the AARS report. This year, we need to help them out. Demonstrations will be provided by experts from the Santa Clara County Rose Society. (rain back-up date is January 19th)
- May 3, 9 a.m. 1 p.m. Pre-Mother's Day
   Deadheading and Weeding. In preparation
   for the busiest weekend of the year, Mother's
   Day, we will be out "in force" the weekend
   prior to tidy up the beds.
- July 12, Summer Deadheading and Weeding.
- September 6 Fall Deadheading and "Special Event" Details to come!

#### **Individual Volunteer Days**

Supervised Weekday Visits

In the spring, we will also be offering a weekday dropin supervised program where park staff will provide a brief lesson on rose care. You will then be free to help out in the garden after this certification.

We are interested in building a team of "Master Volunteers" who have demonstrated the skills to the City Staff and can assist in teaching other volunteers. The plan is to have Master Volunteers identified with a special vest signifying their commitment and hours they have put into the garden. 

## Maximum Garden Display Pruning

Pruning roses in not rocket science, but there are many misconceptions. The problem is that most often, bad techniques don't kill the bush right away. They continue to produce blooms, but slowly, and weakly, through the years until ultimately, they end up being poor performers. In addition, how you prune a rose bush depends upon where you are in the country. Very cold climates require hard pruning methods and mounding of dirt to protect them from frost. You might have learned this technique from your mother growing up in the northeast and brought it with you to San Jose. However, we don't need to do it here.



Also, do you want a massive display of roses or are you a rose exhibitor looking for the perfect rose that will win "Queen of the Show". For exhibitors, they will prune hard, so all the energy is put into that one bloom. However, in the in a display garden, and guite possible your home, you want an abundance of blooms, also called "MAXIMUM **GARDEN DISPLAY**" pruning. This is what we at the Friends of the San Jose Rose Garden has will be doing at the Muni Rose Garden on January 12. technique has not been used at this garden and the city is interested to see the results. ## **Rose Garden Staff**

The first six months of 2007 were hard on the Rose Garden. Promotions of parks staff left just one employee to run day to day operations. As spring came and went, the overwhelming job of deadheading and weeding of the park fell behind.

In May, just as the positions were to be filled the deteriorating conditions of the Garden became front page news. Getting back on top of the situation was going to be difficult amid the scrutiny that the publicity had brought.

Lance Loveday (left) and Mike Azevedo (right) started their work at the garden in June. Though they have many years of experience between them, this will be their first season here in the Rose Garden. They are fully committed to turning the garden around and happy to work with the Friends of the Rose Garden in their volunteer efforts.



Lance, who holds the position of Gardener, previously worked a route taking care of multiple parks. Lance received the Rose Garden assignment because of his work ethic. People have been impressed with his "can do attitude". Having one big park to take care of instead of many small ones has it's benefits. It doesn't hurt that it's a beautiful park. "I enjoy working here 5 days a week, it's a great experience" says Lance.

Mike, the groundsworker, comes from the San Jose International Airport. When he first heard of his new assignment, he took his two toddlers, one and three years old, to play in the big field and see the garden for the first time. Mike got enthusiastic about his new park and traveled to rose gardens across the country including Texas, Berkeley, and the famous Portland Rose Garden. He took the time to visit with the gardeners there and asked them questions about their techniques. He knows with roses it's going to take some time for the results to show in this garden. Mike is really looking forward to the spring when all the hard work will finally pay off. Of the gardens he visited, the one thing he found that made the difference was the strong volunteer effort, "Volunteers are the wave of the future for this garden" says Mike, "the best rose gardens had lots of help, and that will make the difference".

The City of San Jose had three full time positions a couple years ago. With the budget shortfalls, they are staffing it with only two. If you see Lance or Mike in the garden, say "hi" and thank them for their work!
