Winter Pruning Seminar and Volunteer Day - Saturday, January 9th Registration @ 8:30a.m.

It's that time of year again!

On January 9th we will have our 9th Annual Winter Pruning of the Rose Garden. Registration begins at 8:30am, and the event begins at 9:00am.

Last Year 462 volunteers were trained and pruned the 4,000 roses in 90 minutes!

Over the years, we have refined our techniques to make it easier and more efficient for the volunteers. We will be entering in the Dana Ave entrance, and the first 400 volunteers will receive a free bare root rose from Star Roses! We have some great varieties this year to choose from, so make sure you come early. We will also have food trucks after the event, so bring a few bucks to enjoy a great lunch afterwards.

Many volunteers remember which beds they worked on so they can come back during the season and look at the results - a bit of "ownership" in the Rose Garden. Please bring work gloves and garden clippers. All ages welcome! Hope to see you there!


And the Winner is..... "Violet's Pride™"

The San Jose Municipal Rose Garden visitors got a real treat in 2015. Christian Bédard, Director of Research at Weeks Roses allowed us to plant a full bed of new rose variety to be introduced in 2017, and asked for visitors to suggest a name to be considered for the rose.

Some fun facts: over 300 suggestions were made from visitors from 25 different States, and some visitors as far away as New Zealand and India! There were many great suggestions, and some very in-depth reasons the visitors suggested the names.

In the end, Weeks Roses chose "Violet's PrideTM", and while no one had suggested this specific name, there were many close derivations. As a bonus for suggesting a name, everyone was entered in a drawing to receive a package of 5 pre-release roses: a plant of Violet's PrideTM, All My Loving, Cupid's Kisses, Easy To Please and Tropical Lightning. These are all not available to the public yet, but will be released in 2017! 5 Lucky winners have already been contacted. What's even more special, is this rose will be part of the Downton Abbey® Collection! The Weeks Roses Downton Abbey® Collection began in 2015 with Anna's PromiseTM, the 2016 introduction is Pretty Lady RoseTM, and 2017 will be two roses, Violet's PrideTM, and Edith's DarlingTM.

Because of the success of this contest, Christian has provided us with another rose, to be introduced in 2018, and we will have a similar contest this year! So look for that sign again in the Garden!





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Industry Rose Growers Help Out

Every year, a group of Master Volunteers review the rose beds in the Garden for consideration of replacements. If a rose is not doing well, we decide to have it removed and planted with a better rose. Last year, over 800 new roses were planted and they are looking fabulous. None of this could be possible without the support of Weeks Roses and Star Roses. These industry leaders donate the roses to the Friends of the Rose Garden, and in turn, to the City of San Jose. City Staff does a great job ripping out and preparing the beds for the Volunteers to plant.

This year, we have identified about a dozen beds for renovation. In January and February, we will have several "Plant-a-palooza's", inviting volunteers to come and help plant the roses. We selected several varieties that will be available in 2017, and well as focusing on varieties with great fragrance!



Star Roses and Weeks Roses also use the Garden to test new varieties. These test roses stay in the garden for 2 years, and are evaluated on 10 different attributes, most importantly, disease resistance. Only about 20% of the test roses actually make it to market.

So when you are buying roses for your own garden, remember Star Roses and Weeks Roses are big supporters of the Rose Garden!

New Rose Varieties for 2016

We are replaced over a dozen rose beds and replacing them with new varieties of roses, focusing on fragrance. Here's a few to look for:

Falling in Love

Big, classically formed blooms with staying power. Nice deep green foliage accents the warm pink blooms. Flower size: 4.5" Fragrance: Strong rose and fruit. Hybridizer: Carruth - Weeks Roses - 2008 Parentage: Moonstone x Marilyn Monroe

Lasting Love

A hybrid tea with dusky red blooms. This upright and very bushy plant has very dark glossy green foliage. Flower size: 5" Fragrance: Rich pure old rose. Hybridizer: Adam - 1993. Parentage: Colour Wonder x Manou Meilland

Melody Parfumée

Deep plum, high centered blooms on this grandiflora will stop visitors in their tracks.

Flower size: 4"-5" Fragrance: Heavy old rose.


Hybridizer: Dorieux - 1999.

Parentage: Dioressence x Stephen's Big Purple

Pumpkin Patch

This floribunda's rich coppery buds open to clusters of orange beauties against shiny green leaves. Flower size: 4" Fragrance: Moderately fruity. Hybridizer: Bédard - Weeks Roses - 2010.

Parentage: Goldmarie x Honey Dijon

New Rose Varieties for 2016

New Zealand

A nice classic hybrid tea with a soft pink color against deep green glossy foliage.

Flower size: 4.5" Fragrance: Strong

Honeysuckle Hybridizer: McGredy - 1995

Parentage: Harmonie x Aukland Metro

Phloxy Baby

Part of Star Roses Look-A-Likes® series, this polyantha hybrid looks very similar to Phlox. We grew it a few years ago in the test beds and are happy to have a full bed of this unusual rose. It is very disease resistant and won the regional award from the American Garden Rose Selections Flower size: 1" in big sprays. Hybridizer: Radler - 2014.




This floribunda was grown before in the Garden, but the plants had seen better days. So we are giving it another try with new bushes. It has full clear pink blooms are sometimes borne in huge clusters that virtually cover the plant. Flower size: 3"-5" Fragrance: Slight. Hybridizer: McGredy - 1984. Parentage: Seaspray x Dreaming


Betty Boop

Another replacement we are giving another try with new bushes. Named for the famed animated character it is a showstopper with never ending blooms. Flower size: 4" Fragrance: Moderately fruity. Hybridizer: Carruth - Weeks 1999. Parentage: Playboy x Picasso

Bare Root Roses?

You've seen some of the beautiful varieties growing in the Rose Garden this year and have decided to purchase some bare root roses for your garden this winter. Maybe it will be one of the new 2016 pre-releases like Gold Struck or Pretty Lady RoseTM. Whatever variety you chose, you want to make sure you choose a rose that is disease resistant and will thrive after planting in your garden.

Winter is time for bare root roses. We will be giving out over 400 bare root roses to the pruning volunteers courtesy of Star Roses. I always fid it funny to see the high school kids look perplexed when given their "free" bare root rose. Many were expected a rose bush leafed out in a pot, growing....

Bare root roses are dormant plants with, just as the name says, bare roots. You will want to plant these quickly once you purchase them. Most nurseries have these bare roots "healed in" to soil to keep the roots moist. You pull them up out of the soil and purchase them.

Most modern roses you purchase will be budded onto rootstock, and have a few canes growing out from the bud union. They will also have a "grade" assigned to it. Grade #1 must have at least three strong canes of 5/16 inch diameter or greater. Grade #1.5 must have at least two strong canes 5/16 inch or greater, and a #2 must have at least one strong cane of 5/16 of an inch or greater and one ½ inch or greater. The canes must have been 16 inches before harvest and have a strong root system. We have done side-by-side tests in the Rose Garden planting #1's and #1.5's in the same beds. After a year, there is really not that much difference. In fact, one bed, the #1.5's were doing better than the 1's! The ones you often see on sale for a few dollars at the local supermarket/drugstores are usually #2's and should be avoided.

GRADE #1

It is best to buy roses that you can inspect the roots. At most large nurseries, such as Regan Nursery in Fremont, you can do this. Hardware store nurseries typically have them wrapped in plastic and packaged in sawdust or other material. However, the packaging technology has been getting better and the boxed roses I've seen from Weeks at OSH look very good. Just makes sure the canes look healthy and hydrated. The big growers that you can count on are Weeks Roses, Star Roses and Austin Roses. Other growers might be hit-or-miss. Some dip their canes in wax, so they don't dry out. I'd avoid these.

You have many choices on where to purchase roses. Big Box Stores, Garden Centers, supermarkets, membership warehouses, mail order, and specialty nurseries. You will find some of the largest selection of bare root roses at Regan Nursery in Fremont (www.regannursery.com) where you can inspect the rose plant, roots and all, before you purchase.

Because we have access to such fine rose suppliers where you can inspect the whole plant, or get them by mail order, it is best to purchase roses in this manner, and leave the pre-packaged hardware store roses to others.

Rose Hip Jelly

Rose Hips are a natural part of the rose bush's life cycle. Hips form when the bloom is not cut and when it becomes pollinated. It signals the


plant to shut down, and store energy for the winter. You should not see rose hips on roses in July. This means the roses have not been "deadheaded" and new blooms will not form. According to WikiPedia, rose hips have many interesting uses. "Rose hips have recently become popular as a healthy treat for pet chinchillas and guinea pigs. These small rodents are unable to manufacture their own vitamin C and are unable to digest many vitamin-C rich foods. Rose hips provide a sugarless way to increase vitamin C intake. Rose hips are fed to horses to improve coat condition and promote new hoof growth.

The fine hairs found inside rose hips are used in itching powder. Rose hips can be used to make Palinka, a traditional Hungarian alcoholic beverage. They are also the central ingredient of Cockta, the national soft drink of Slovenia."

Typically, Rose Hips are used for jam, jelly, syrup, teas, lotions and other traditional

products.

In the San Jose Municipal Rose Garden, we try to stop deadheading after October to encourage hip growth, and signal the plants to prepare for winter. Many of the varieties produce decorative hips, and provide an educational opportunity for Garden visitors who ask our volunteers about these red or orange balls on the rose bush. Recently, we held a seminar on hips for our Master Volunteers. It included a tasting of Rose Hip Jelly. Three jars of homemade Rose Hip Jelly were given away to a few lucky participants. Mystery Rose Named!









Sharpen Your Pruning Shears
